Ward work in PPE: a self-portrait in pastel"

I am a general medical SHO working in Nevill Hall Hospital, Abergavenny, Wales.

Since staff have been required to wear face masks for all patient interactions, I have been trying to process how this has changed the way we interact. It has made me think about how other people perceive the things I say or do and how I see myself in my current role. Eyes are now a particularly key part of reading facial expressions. Drawing this self-portrait forced me to study my own eyes and reflect on how difficult it must be for others to read my emotions and intentions. I have drawn this based on a picture I took of myself while at work. I think my eyes appear shell-shocked and almost numb. Dark circles reflect how drained I am (physically and emotionally). I also generally feel less put-together and composed since replacing my work wardrobe with scrubs and constantly donning and doffing PPE. This sums up my much of my experience at work during the pandemic so far



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
