Please get in touch if you have any thoughts or ideas of how we could be supporting and encouraging you as a committee - we would love to hear them.



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
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RESEARCH OF THE MONTH

DIGITALLY RECORDING COMFORT OBSERVATIONS IN THE LAST DAYS OF LIFE

After the success of the APM supported SEECARE work Seeking Excellence in End of Life Care UK (SEECare UK): a UK multi-centred service evaluation | BMJ Supportive & Palliative Care we wanted to build on local data collection around our end of life care provision.

We are fortunate to have an electronic comfort observation system through patient track which naively I assume most trusts have alongside Microsoft power BI we have been not only able to build a dashboard and ward watcher window but to add an electronic version of SEECARE so we have a rolling audit.

Using this method we produce a P score rather than a NEWS score – from PO – no symptoms to P3 –severe uncontrolled symptoms (or a combination of 2 or more significant symptoms or concerns such as pain / breathlessness etc). Over 75% of dying patients are now monitored using this process with over 90% being seen by our team as the seecare data suggests is best practice.

The key findings are that patients are on comfort obs for 3 days (more than the NACEL 48 hours) the vast majority are well symptom controlled with 75% being PO and there is rapid control with a reduction in scores to P O measured in 2-3 hours. Additionally we can then break down by wards that need more support and education, interventions and prescribing. We can also add patients to our list when put on comfort obs as we monitor this daily as part of our standard work.



The obvious advantage is this is routinely collected and analysed data with a lovely dashboard to view and present at divisional and trust boards. What we would like to know is how widespread is this work and any obstacles to data collection. Our IT department are quite happy to share the know how if you have these systems in your trust. We would also welcome exploring this work in other settings where the IT allows.

What is known

Approximately 50% of the population die in hospital – recognising when to involve palliative care and focus on comfort is still unclear and the expertise may not always be available

Comfort observations can be recorded electronically in place of NEWS scores for patients who are likely to be in the last days (possibly weeks) of life where no treatment escalation is planned

What this study adds

A set of comfort obs can generate a symptom score and signal the need for intervention for good end of life care in hospital.



Power BI can collate this data into a dashboard to be used for global trends and education and support symptom management prompts – this will be more useful once there is a national dataset and link to electronic prescribing and automatic referrals to hospital palliative care teams

This system could be adapted for virtual wards and other methods of remote monitoring in any setting including care homes where dying patients are looked after

Limitations

This is one large teaching hospital but the results should and could be replicated nationally and probably have widespread generalisability
