Research Highlights

Dr Ishbel Winter-Luke, the APMJ research coordinator is highlighting some recent exciting research published in 2024. Though Palliative Medicine remains an under-funded research topic, there are lots of people contributing worldwide to provide high quality, evidence-based palliative care to those who need it.

The mediating effects of death reflection on death literacy and death anxiety among Chinese nurses: a cross-sectional study Xiaoke Zhang et al. 2024 Nature: Scientific Reports.

This study collates survey results from nurses in China surrounding their death reflection, literacy and anxiety. I think it is important to remember the educational needs of those working in both general and specialist palliative care settings to ensure health care professionals can deliver high quality care to patients.

Referral to pulmonary rehabilitation and palliative care services in people with idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis in England, 2010–2019. Ann D. Morgan et al 2024. NPJ: Primary Care Respiratory Medicine.

This study looks at data retrospectively for referral to pulmonary rehabilitation and palliative care services over a 9-year period, in idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis population. The study highlights that referral to palliative care services is often too late with 31% only referred in the last month of life. The number of patients who were referred to palliative care was 20% compared to 75% for those with lung cancer. This study provides evidence that access to palliative care in non-malignant disease remains challenging, especially when compared to malignant disease, but it is encouraging that over the study period, referrals were increasing.

"I have never felt so alone and vulnerable" – A qualitative study of bereaved people's experiences of end-of-life cancer care during the Covid-19 pandemic. Burton et al 2024. BMC Palliative Care.

As the world continues to gradually recover from the impacts of Covid-19, this study contributes to our reflections on the impact Covid-19 had on close friends and family of people who were lost during the pandemic.
